Stand A: Enrichment planting 1985

Stand B: Partial cut (2007)

Stand C: Pre-commercial thinning (1996)

**Fire Rehab**

**Stop 2:**

Fire origin aspen / conifer stand (1943)

Stand A: Clear cut (1988) aspen/birch/BF/WP stand

Stand B: Partial cut (1994); second entry (2010)

**Stop 3:**

Pine / black spruce stand (multiple burn)

-Shelterwood harvest; 1<sup>st</sup> entry (1994); 2<sup>nd</sup> entry (2009)

**Stop 4:**

Modified expanding gap “Femelschlag” (1935 burn)

-1<sup>st</sup> entry (1987); 2<sup>nd</sup> entry (2006)

**Beech Rehab**

**Stop 5:**

Beech conversion to spruce / yellow birch (1994)

**Stop 6:**

Beech removal and northern hardwood re-establishment (1994)

-Yellow birch seed tree cut (1992)
